## The New York School for Medical and Dental Assistants (NYSMDA) Grant Disbursement Policy and Quarterly Report Covering January 1, 2022 – March 31, 2022

EMERGENCY FINANCIAL AID GRANT FUNDS
Under the Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds (HEERF) II and III

Under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA) (Pub. L. 116-260) and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP) (Pub. L. 117-2)

NYSMDA signed and returned to the United States Department of Education Certification and Agreements and the assurance that the institution intends to use the funds received under CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs to provide emergency financial aid grants to students.

On February 18, 2021, \$308,868.00 was available to NYSMDA under HEERF II. On July 27, 2021, and additional \$181,954 became available under HEERF III. As of March 31, 2022 NYSMDA has \$20,222 available under HEERF III. All the HEERF II funding has been disbursed. NYSMDA is required to disburse these funds to eligible students who need assistance as instructed in the Act. NYSMDA students enrolled between February 24, 2021, and January 31, 2021, who have not received a previous HEERF disbursement who because of the disruption of campus operations due to the coronavirus needs assistance for eligible expenses such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care (including mental healthcare) and childcare have received an emergency financial aid grant. Students who are on a leave of absence who have not received a previous HEERF disbursement also qualify as current NYSMDA students. Students who have graduated are not eligible for the grant because they are not current students. If a student has completed all their program requirements, they are considered a graduate regardless of whether their credential has been issued.

NYSMDA will distribute the EFAG grants based on need with the needier students receiving more grant money than those who are not as needy. NYSMDA will determine a student's need by their Expected Family Contribution (EFC). NYSMDA will calculate the amount of a student's grant based on their 21/22 EFC.

If a student did not file a FASFA for 21/22 but filed a FASFA for 20/21 then NYSMDA will use the student's 20/21 EFC to calculate their EFAG. If a student did not file a FASFA for either year the student will be eligible for the minimum \$500 grant. A student who has not filed a FASFA can file a FASFA and receive a higher amount if they have an EFC that is less than \$4,000. The amount of the grant will be based on the table below:

NYSMDA will be distributing EFAG to students who start on February 28, 2022. Because of limited funds the amounts of these distributions will differ from the amounts listed above. The amount of each students grant is based on the table below:

Students may apply for additional EFAG funds if they have extreme financial need. A situation that would constitute extreme financial need would be homelessness or the threat of becoming homeless. To apply they must write a letter to their Program Director explaining their need for additional EFAG funds. NYSMDA may ask for proof the student is in the shelter system. This applies even if a student previously received an EFAG.

Students may appeal their EFC number if they can demonstrate that the COVID-19 pandemic adversely affected them since they filed their 21/22 FASFA and that they would have had a lower EFC if these circumstances had been their circumstances when they applied for financial aid. Factors for a successful appeal may include but are not limited to loss of a job or increased parental responsibilities.

A check will be issued to the student and will be sent to the address that the school has on file. If you are a student at the New York campus, ensure that the school has the correct address for you in the Orbund System. If you are a student at the Idaho Campus, make sure that you call the school if you have changed your address since enrolling.

The check will be sent with the attached attestation form (See Exhibit 1). If a student does not have a need for the funds that follows the attestation form, then they are required to send the check back to the school.

Student disbursements will be tracked with a HEERF grant disbursement ledger. The ledger will be checked daily to determine the checks that are outstanding. If a check is outstanding for 30 days than the school will contact the student to verify their address, stop payment on the initial check and reissue a check, if needed.

Between February 18, 2021, and March 31, 2022, NYSMDA distributed \$470,600 of HEERF II and III EFAG to 524 eligible students. Between January 1, 2022, and March 31, 2022, \$44,600 of EFAGs were distributed to 49 eligible students.
